

Dinghy Sailing Hints and Tips



Reaching for Performance

I have done a decent amount of Windsurfing, in fact, I enjoyed a miss spent youth just reaching around most of the time. Windsurfing on short boards that sink if you go too slow, really keeps you focused on moving fast. In this article, I will quickly cover some basics of building and maintaining boat speed when Reaching.

Apparent Wind

This is the wind actually going over the sails generating lift and causing drag.

It is not the true wind blowing over the water, but the combined effects of boat speed and direction, tidal flow and the true Wind. It is what keeps the boat moving.

Using apparent wind becomes more significant the faster you go. This can be explained by the fact that more of the wind hitting your sails is being generated by your movement, rather than the True Wind, which is blowing over the water.

Even in a Sabot you will feel that the wind seems stronger when beating upwind than when you are running downwind.

Apparent wind *increases* if you travel into the wind.

Apparent wind *decreases* if you travel away from the wind.

How can we use this apparent wind for reaching faster?

Heading and Steering

In underpowered conditions, when keeping the boat on the plane is a challenge, Head up in the lulls to increase the apparent wind and help establish speed. Once moving well, bear off and steer as low as possible without loosing speed. Look for surfing opportunities. If you sense the boat is slowing and in danger of dropping off the plane, sheet in and head up a little to maintain boat speed. Do this BEFORE you drop off the plane.

When gusts hit or good waves present themselves, turn downwind and sail a lower course to follow the gust downwind and stay in the strong wind longer. Aim to position your boat lower than the imaginary line straight between the marks. This will allow you to sail higher later during the lulls in between the gusts. Staying on the plane longer puts you further ahead of the next boat.

Sail trim

Sails produce Lift and Drag. We tend to just mix the two together and deal with the single combined force to do what we call sailing.

Separating the two makes it easy to understand what works (or what is needed) to get better performance for any given point of sail.

Boats go better upwind, if the Lift is optimised without creating excess Drag.

When Reaching, Lift can be maximised even at the expense of creating more Drag.

For going down wind, Drag is fine and Lift is not really required. Spinnakers are the Drag specialists with their hooked leech and deep draft or camber.

Reaching is what we are talking about here today. Set up for plenty of Draft, slacken the Cunningham and Outhaul, ease the Vang to allow some twist. This also lets the end of the boom lift up to help clear waves. The twist can help reduce the heeling moment in stronger winds and open the leech. Some Over Sheeting can be tolerated as Drag is not a big penalty. Over sheeting can be good to accommodate the apparent wind swinging forward as you accelerate on to the plane or surf down a wave.

Reaching can be Shy (upwind) or Broad (downwind). In these cases, some thought needs to be given to the sail trim requirements mentioned for Upwind and Downwind, Flatten and reduce drag for Shy reaching. Deepen draft and power up for Broad reaching.

Boat trim

Boat trim is dependent on hull shape, the basic guideline is to utilise the flat section if you want to plane. If you don't know where the flat section is on the bottom of your boat, have a look. Don't expect to plane fast if you heel the boat and present the chine or curved part of the hull to the water.

Moving forward for more area can be good to help plane at lower speed. Moving aft at high speed helps keep the bow from burying and reduces wetted surface area and drag.

If you can not plane, trim so the transom is not dragging water.

Adjust your Heel to neutralize the helm. If takes effort to hold the tiller you are creating drag and holding the boat back. You are not letting it reach its full speed.

About Martin Cooper,

I graduated from PCSC Learn to sail in 1977. Since 1977, my longest absence from some type of sailing has been about 6 months.

Still learning today, I don't really know much about boats, but I have a good understanding of the wind. I gained some dinghy experience sailing locally boats such as; Sabot, Manly Junior, Cherub, Sharpie and Laser. I've had the odd run in a Cobra cat and 12' Skiff. On rare occasions I have crewed on some longer boats that had winches and lead on the keel.

Most of my ocean experience is from windsurfing, specifically on the shorter boards and in stronger winds. In the late Eighties, I was a sponsored sailor. I was respected at a national level and was employed as a sailboard shaper.

I regularly competed in international professional events. On several occasions, I finished in the top ten and was amongst the best performing Australians.

I currently race Division 4 in a Club Pacer. I am privileged to be crewing for Jack Paul. Cheerful in all weathers, Jack is recognised as the club's most talented skipper under 35kg.

Last weekend all of the region's sailing action was staged on the beautiful waters of Keppel Bay with the running of the annual Round the Bay Race. Hosted by the Capricornia Cruising Yacht Club (CCYC) of Rosslyn Bay, this coveted race often attracts a strong, competitive fleet, and this year was no exception.

The first windward leg of the day's course directed the Division 1 fleet east from the start line to The Child Island. A beam reach followed to a mark just north of Sea Hill on the northern tip of Curtis Island, where sailors trimmed cracked sheets, powering them back to where it all began for a fast finish.

Lex Moran's trimaran Doctor's Orders competed in this division and reveled in the conditions. Speed was the name of the game in the second and third legs of the course where the Doctor made up ground lost on the slower upwind section of the course. The crew sailed the boat with surgical precision but were pipped on line and handicap marginally by Wild Spirit, a much larger racing multihull, taking out second place.
