Just a few notes on the sailing scene;



QUEENSLAND IMPULSE STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS TOUGH FIGHT FOR PODIUM

The 2017 Downer Queensland Impulse State Championships were held over the Queen's Birthday long weekend at Port Curtis Sailing Club, Gladstone.

The was the first time the impulses had ventured to central Queensland for a state championship, and the move proved to be a resounding success, with a record fleet of 30 boats competing in a Queensland State Championship.

The regatta attracted many new boats and faces, which was held in moderate to fresh conditions was generously sponsored by the Downer Group and monkeyfist.com.au.

Competitors travelled from as far as the Tweed River in NSW, South East Queensland, Keppel Bay, as well as a strong contingent of 15 local Gladstone boats.





The championship was taken out by local hotshot and defending state champion Dave Mann sailing 'Gold Digger'. This boat is one of the new generation of impulses built by Freddy Phillips from Dinghy Sports on the Northern Beaches of Sydney. Immediately after the regatta Mann sold his boat to another Gladstone local and he is now is preparations for a new boat.

In second place was current Australian championship runner-up Andrew Turnbull-Miller in his brand new Ray Hobbs built 'Boaty McBoatface' from Oxley Sailing Club on the Brisbane River. Turnbull-Miller showed amazing speed for a boat that had been launched only the previous week and as usual displayed sound tactics.

In third place, was another Gladstone local and newcomer to the class, Joshua Young, in his Tim Wilson built 'Slipknot'. Young was extremely quick and would have challenged Mann and Turnbull-Miller further if it wasn't minor errors at mark roundings. Young is travelling to the National Championships in Adelaide over the Christmas/New Year period and could be considered one of the early favourites.



For a class that barely existed in Queensland 10 years ago, to now being one of the most popular classes in the State the rise of the Impulse is extraordinary.

The next major events on the Impulse calendar include the national championships at Brighton Seacliff Yacht Club, South Australia over the Christmas/New Year Period and the Eastern States on the Clarence River Harwood Island, Northern NSW in March 2018.

THE 70th BRISBANE TO GLADSTONE OCEAN RACE WITH MARYKE BARKER

Easter 2018. Queensland Cruising Yacht Club and the Port Curtis Sailing Club will celebrate the 70th Brisbane to Gladstone Ocean Yacht Race. Maryke Barker has uncovered the Gladstone Observer article describing the dinner and trophy presentation celebrating the very first race in 1949. <u>Enjoy the read!</u>

Part One

THE GLADSTONE OBSERVER, SATURDAY, APRIL 23, 1949 CIVIC WELCOME VISITING YACHTSMEN ENTERTAINED

The successful conclusion of the first Brisbane to Gladstone ocean yacht race was fittingly celebrated on Tuesday evening when the skippers and crews of the visiting yachts and other visitors were entertained at a dinner in the Town Hall.

The mayor (Ald. J. F. O'Malley) presided and extended a warm civic welcome to the visitors on behalf of the citizens of Gladstone.

The handsome trophies for the race, which were donated by Brisbane business houses, including the "Courier-Mail" Cup, were presented to the winners by the mayor.

A telegram was received from the manager of the "Courier-Mail" regretted his inability to be present to hand over the cup to the winner, and entrusted the performance of this pleasant ceremony to Mr. O'Malley.

"BRITISH EMPIRE"

After the "Loyal" toast had been honoured, that of the "British Empire" was ably proposed by Mr. W. R. Golding.

Q.C.Y. CLUB

The toast of the "Queensland Cruising Yacht Club" was proposed by the mayor (Ald. J. F. O'Malley) who said it would be accepted by all present with the greatest of pleasure. Six months ago, he said, Mr. Drouyn had convened a meeting for the purpose of forming the Q.C.Y. Club. This meeting was attended by approximately ten persons. The club was formed, but they did not then realise that this small body would play such an important part in the history of Queensland.

When Gladstone was first contacted as to the possibility of staging a Brisbane to Gladstone yacht race, Mr. O'Malley said he made enquiries as to the credentials of the club. The information supplied reflected the utmost credit on the members and Gladstone was pleased to co-operate with the club in this great historic event.

The popular club secretary (Mr. Drouyn), he said, carried out most of the spade work in the early stages, and was later assisted by one of Brisbanes's most outstanding, Mr. C. Elton, as publicity officer to the club.

Continuing, Mr. O'Malley said that as a result of this race Brisbane and Gladstone had already gained nation-wide publicity. It had now been decided that it would be an annual event and he had the assurance of the citizens of Gladstone that next year Gladstone would contribute the whole of the prize money for the race.

Further, said Mr. O'Malley, a short time ago the Queensland Government appointed a select committee to investigate the possibilities of developing the tourist resorts of Queensland, and this committee, realising the importance of the Great Barrier Reef as a tourist resort of Queensland, recommended the promotion of an ocean yacht race in Queensland waters. The Queensland Cruising Yacht Club had now gained that objective and persuasive powers should be used to induce the Government of Queensland to assist in financing major yacht races of national importance in Queensland waters.

For the past week, he said, Gladstone, in conjunction with the Queensland Cruising Yacht Club, had enjoyed pride of place with the Radio and the Press.

It was proposed to stage a major yacht race in 1953 in conjunction with Gladstone's Centenary celebrations when every endeavour would be made to attract ocean-going yachts from other nations and he felt confident that Doug Drouyn, Commodore Manahan, and members of the Q.C.Y. Club would participate in that race.

In conclusion, Mr. O'Malley expressed the sincere hope that the membership of the club would continue to grow and that prosperity would reign for the club in the years to come.
